Last year was my year for tooth pain. I had two root canals, a crown, and in utter defeat, an extraction. I love my dentist, but enough is enough!

Then last week, I met a homeless friend who declined an offer of pepperoni pizza because of tooth pain. It isn't the first time I've encountered a homeless friend dealing with dental issues. Access to routine care costs money. Because my friend has started working, the low-cost clinics are going to charge full rate. And what do you do about getting to a dentist during the week, when you are working an hourly job, and it is "go-go-go" all day long? Such is the case for my friend.

It's cold. It's wet. And their teeth hurt. It's heart-breaking.

Seems weird to say, but going to the dentist is a luxury. No more complaining!

Sometimes the problems we see at Nightwatch are easily solvable. We gave an Orca card to a new worker. We sent people out-of-town to where they won't be homeless anymore. We bought blankets for a chilly shelter. These problems have easy fixes. It just takes money. But saving a molar? It can be tricky.

Lord, look with compassion on us all, as we help our homeless friends and neighbors. •

It was a chance meeting. One brisk fall afternoon a few years ago, a young man showed up at Nightwatch. He'd been told by someone on the street that we could help him.

Here was Rudy. Living out of his car, struggling financially and having familial problems. I liked him immediately. You could tell he had a good heart. After hearing some of his story, we made plans to meet up again so I could hear more about his situation and to see how we could help him.

That one lunch turned into nearly two years of walking alongside Rudy through the ups and downs of life. He moved into a transitional housing program and back to his car; in a tent for a while and then into another transitional housing program. He went through four different jobs, battled with alcohol to cope, and had legal trouble.

The whole time I was there. Listening as he told me his frustrations of living without a home, and encouraging him to keep going; things would get better. Finally, they did.

He reconnected with some family in another state. One of his relatives had a large house that was mostly vacant. He could have one of the rooms. They would even buy his bus ticket to get there. Hallelujah! Rudy was moving on to greener pastures.

Wouldn't you know it? A few weeks ago, I got a call from Rudy. I hadn't spoken with him for over a year. He wanted to thank me for all of my help, and share some good news with me. Rudy had bought his own house. He had gone all that way from having no home here in Seattle, and now he actually had his own home. After we hung up, he texted me a few pictures of his house. It was beautiful. Your gifts make stuff like this happen. •

Right now, while it's cold and rainy here, my friend is sailing a boat down in the Gulf of Mexico. I'm not a sailor, but that really sounds good to me.

I don't know what makes sailboats go. One time, I got to ride on a tall ship; it was a big boat, with beautiful sails and lots of ropes and stately masts. From a distance, we watch these gorgeous ships glide along in silence. We marvel at their grace and how they harness the power of the wind. But close up, under the surface and behind the scenes, it's a whole different thing for the crew onboard.
