Thousands of people have come through our doors over the past 51 years. Every single person coming into Nightwatch received some sort of help – food, shelter, safety, socks, blankets, friendship. Many have used these gifts to rebuild their lives.

One night, about 1995, I was alone at Nightwatch, wondering why there were no volunteers. A single homeless guy "Marcus" stepped up. He served soup and mopped the floors. And he stayed with me until 2:00 a.m.– our closing time back then. Marcus continued to volunteer, long after he got into housing.

All this good rebuilding is a direct result of your support. We don't get help from the City or County, but rely on private donations.

Here's a follow up note about Marcus. We had lunch today after 20 years of not seeing each other. He's doing well. He wanted me to thank you all.

Lord, thank you for your care for the impoverished and broken among us. Grant us the joy of partnering with you in the work of rebuilding. \bullet

I had to think about buildings as being like people. If we begin to look shabby, we might just clean up or put on a fresh set of clothes. If our bodies start to fall apart, we find the cause and correct the problem. If our bones break, we set them and allow them to heal. We do all this to keep going.

Why shouldn't we treat our building like we do people?

We're replacing leaking windows, fixing the roof and painting the building. Inside, we're replacing heaters and carpet. Nightwatch is 51 years old. With this investment of resources, perhaps the building will serve our homeless friends and senior residents for another 50 years.

The project budget is over \$200,000. Many generous friends and supporters have already contributed, as an investment in the future of Nightwatch. Won't you join them?
