## Just a van

The Nightwatch van died. It wasn't the first or the only Nightwatch van to die. This one was given to us by King County Metro. It carried its last homeless guy to shelter a few weeks ago, and finally a tow-truck came and hauled it away.

I was thinking about all the goodness that van made possible. It was used to pick up food from Northwest Harvest and Food Lifeline. Every night it hauled homeless people to shelter. We were able to share blankets with our friends at the women's shelter. I remember a fishing boat that donated a bunch of mattresses that were the wrong size for their purposes, but perfect for us.

I'm pretty sure that we took our seniors out for a fishing trip to Greenlake in that van, or one like it. And of course, we delivered socks and pizzas to homeless people surviving outside on a regular basis.

A giant outpouring of white steam announced its demise. Our worker parked the van about a block from the shelter, on a residential street. And there it sat.

After a few weeks, a tow-truck driver showed up. "Nightwatch, eh? What's that about?" he asked.

"We help homeless people. Food, shelter, housing, street ministry."

This got the approval of the driver. "I was homeless once. Now I have my own business." He went on to tell his story of homelessness, survival and recovery.

It was a beautiful moment. Even in death, the van was helping someone. Farewell, friend!

Lord, we are grateful for the tools you have given us to bless the community; grant us wisdom in all the gifts you have given. •


