

My last newsletter

I felt no need to change jobs in the past 28 years. The job itself changed, along with downtown Seattle and the world around me.

When I started in 1994, the internet and email were brand new. Windows 3.1 powered our computer. Remember floppy disks? Bill Clinton was President and Norm Rice was starting his second term as Mayor of Seattle.

We counted homeless people my first year; just Nightwatch and the police department. We found 453 homeless people my first year, but we only looked around downtown Seattle, because that is

where homeless people were found in 1994. Now homeless people are found throughout the Puget Sound region.

One thing hasn't changed since I started: God continues to love every single homeless human being. So here's the question as I head out the door in June:

Will our love for homeless people retire too?

I recently ran into this quote from James 2 (The Message): "Isn't it obvious that Godtalk without God-acts is outrageous nonsense?" In other words, faith without works is dead. To me, faith has to be lived out. God cares, and we care too. Not just with words, but for real. There is no retiring from love!

Of course I'm sad. Parting is such sweet sorrow. But I'm thrilled that God has heard our collective prayer, and raised up a successor to carry on this work.

His name is Deacon Frank DiGirolamo.

I was showing Deacon Frank the city from my perspective, late one February night, the week of the Seahawks victory parade. About 11:30 p.m. Frank and I squeezed through a hole in a security fence. We walked down a muddy path and found a clump of guys, huddled together against the cold. They gratefully received the blankets we brought with us.

Deacon Frank and I walked into a world populated by rough characters, beaten down, barely surviving. But Deacon Frank recognized that this was a place he needed to be, because even under a roadway, Jesus is there. And he has continued with Operation Nightwatch



since 2014. Now we have arrived this point in time, when he has been selected to be the new Executive Director. He will start full-time this month.

Soon after he got the news of getting hired, Frank said to me, "I hope the Board of Nightwatch doesn't expect me to serve for 28 years." That made me laugh.

This I know. It will be the hardest and most satisfying job Frank will ever have. It has been all of that for me. Thank you, friends of Nightwatch, and thank you God, for the opportunity of the past 28 years.

Please remember to pray for Frank and for the work of Nightwatch during this time.

Lord, please grant Deacon Frank the wisdom to know your will, and the power to do what he cannot do in his own strength. ●

The Senior Housing Program provides affordable rooms for people age 62 and older. Nearly all the seniors have been homeless. Living together with shared bathrooms and kitchens means we especially have to get along with each other. The result? We become a community, COVID or not. And like any community, we laugh, we cry. And wow, have we been through it.

This past month two tenants died. Both guys were

long-time residents at Nightwatch. Ryan had been with us for eight years, and Jim had been here seven years. They both were taken away by ambulances on the same day.

Ryan and Jim each moved into Nightwatch after being homeless for a number of years. Ryan was especially thrilled when he was handed his keys and moved in. Jim was also glad to have a home, safety, comfort, and independence. No more living in a tent village or sleeping in a church basement overnight. Both men had their own space. They could take a shower, cook a meal, and best of all, sleep until noon if they felt like it.

But that's not all. Both Ryan and Jim were artistically gifted individuals. After he moved into Nightwatch senior housing, Ryan got his electric piano out of storage and played to his heart's content. And Jim returned to photography, taking beautiful photos, like the photo of Ryan, above.

When there is a death at Nightwatch, it's always tough on the survivors, whether they were close friends or not. It's emotional. It causes us all to think about our own mortality, staff included. All the petty squabbles that took place now seem insignificant against the backdrop of eternity.

"Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom."

Yes, we laugh and we cry at Nightwatch. It is a part of the human condition, and it is good to know we are not alone.
