"We love because he first loved us." 1 John 4:19 NIV •


A big, friendly welcome By Rev. Rick Reynolds, Street Minister


Thomas had spent eight years living on the streets before becoming a part of our Senior Housing program. I spoke to him almost daily. I personally

cook several meals for the seniors each week, and he especially loved my meatloaf. I think he would have asked me to make it every day! He would also join other seniors and eat a meal at our Dispatch Center from time to time. He had an interesting hobby; he loved to collect rocks. He would bring me rocks that he polished as a gift. One is displayed right now in my office, part of a shadow box.

One of my favorite memories of him is a conversation we had about socks. He liked to wear two different socks, all the time; it was one of the ways he expressed himself. He commented, "Why do we have to wear matching socks?" I surprised him by wearing mismatched socks myself, the very next day.

Towards the end of his life, he reestablished his relationship with his daughter. The stability we provided made this a reality, and I am so thankful for the time the two of them had together. My memories of each and every senior are precious.
